Account of Phoibammon for Building Expenses<sup>1</sup>

P.Prag. Gr. II 172  
Provenance (?)

12,5 × 9 cm

5th/6th century AD

The papyrus is incomplete, the bottom is missing. Traces of a few faded letters of a previous text are recognizable e.g. in l. 2. The hand is a rather practiced semi-cursive, which can be compared to P.Prag. I 45 (522), P.Oxy. LXXII 4913 (462) and P.Oxy. LXVIII 4700 (504). These parallels support a date to the second half of the 5th or the beginning of the 6th century. The Coptic l. 11 appears to have been written with slightly larger and heavier letters, yet the extant text does not offer adequate basis for telling whether a different scribe was involved, or whether the same scribe is using a different graphic style. Double oblique strokes are employed to divide units in the account. The back is blank.

The papyrus preserves the account of Phoibammon for expenses paid to the carpenter(s) (l. 6–9), for a window (l. 11), and for unknown purposes in the months of Phamenoth and Pharmouthi. The scribe started with registering three keratia up to Phamenoth 28, followed by a fourth on an unknown day of Phamenoth (l. 9), which he indicated also by adding l. 5 to the title, and then he continued with three extra entries in Pharmouthi. The second line, which was also added subsequently, might sum up ll. 10–12, in which case the account is complete, or it might constitute an extra entry. The most remarkable feature of this account is the insertion of one item (σι ωωωτ l. 11) in Coptic, which also breaks the organization principle of the lines (date first). This unusual example of bilingualism within a text may result from the scribe not knowing the Greek word for window. A parallel case is P.Leid. Inst. XXV 79 (7th cent.).

#### Commentary

1. χμγ † Σθ: Both Christian symbols appear on document headings and ends from the 4th century on. Σθ is a well-known isopsephism for amen. The meaning of χμγ is uncertain, it has been interpreted as an isopsephism for θεὸς βοηθός, an abbreviation for Χριστὸν Μαρία γεννᾷ vel. sim., or Χριστὸς μάρτυς γένηται vel. sim. The exact significance might have been lost already in antiquity. For recent discussion and bibliography see M. 3. Φαμενώθ κη: Although η is only imperfectly visible, and could be a faded letter of the previous script, the structure of the account suggests that the date should be greater than or equal to 27 (l. 8), which supports 28 here. The first version of the list was apparently written one day after the last payment of the first three keratia was made, and it was supplemented later. The actual beginning of the account is marked by a cross.

5. This line was added subsequently between l. 4 and 6, together with the division line that was formed as an extension to the abbreviation οῦ(τωc) and the final c of ἡμέρας. While τέταρτον could mean a quarter as well, referring to payments of  $\frac{1}{4}$  keratia each day rather than one, the fact that the account lists payments of one keration, and that l. 4 was added subsequently supports the hypothesis of a reference to a fourth keration, a continuation to the account.

6. τέκ(tovi/toci?): The reading is clear in all four lines, the interpretation is not. The abbreviation of the word is well-attested, e.g. in P.Cair.Masp. II 67145 (Aphroditos, 524 to 554), P.Cair.Masp. III 67288 4r.11 (Aphroditos, 6th cent.), P.Eirene I 33 (Hermopolites, first half of 7th cent.), or P.Jena II 33 (Hermopolites, late 5th-6th cent.). The dative is justified by the fact that the account is for expenses (cf. l. 11 σι ωωωτ “for window”). Plural is equally conceivable. The lack of the definite article is unexpected, but cf. P.Kell. IV 96 1755-1756 (361/62 or 379/380, τέκτονι μ(άτια) β) or P.Mich. XV 740.23 (6th cent., κονδίταρ(ίω) ὁμοί(ωc) μν(ριάδαc) φ).

9. Φαμενώθ [ . . ]: If the process of drawing up of the account is reconstructed correctly, the number should be greater than or equal to 28, thus 28, 29 and 30 are the likely candidates.


10. Φαρμοῦθι: The date of this and the last entry should fall between 1 and 10 Pharmouthi.

11. σι ωωω[τ]: Although the beginning of the line is mutilated, there is not enough space for the definite article ή or the indefinite ογ.
